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SUBJECT: AMENDMENTS TO HACKNEY CARRIAGE AND PRIVATE HIRE POLICY

Wards affected: Borough wide

1.0 PURPOSE OF REPORT

- 1.1 To approve the draft Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Licensing Policy Statement prior to public consultation.
- 1.2 To approve the list of vehicles designated for the purposes of Section 165 of the Equality Act 2010.

2.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

- 2.1 That the draft Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Licensing Policy Statement attached at Appendix 2 to this report be approved.
- 2.2 That the Director of Leisure and Wellbeing be given delegated authority to subject the draft Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Licensing Policy Statement to a period of public consultation before returning the document to the Licensing and Appeals Committee for final approval.
- 2.3 That the list of vehicles designated for the purposes of Section 165 of the Equality Act 2010 attached at Appendix 3 to this report be approved with effect from 3 July 2017.
- 2.4 That the Director of Leisure and Wellbeing be given delegated authority to publish and maintain the list of vehicles designated for the purposes of Section 165 of the Equality Act 2010 attached at Appendix 3 to this report.

3.0 BACKGROUND

3.1 The Council's Hackney Carriage and Private Hire Policy Statement (the Policy) has been reviewed regularly since it came into force in 2010; most recently in February 2016. However, changes in legislation relating to the accessibility of vehicles and immigration, as well as the need to review existing safeguarding controls, necessitate amendment to the Policy.

4.0 ISSUES

4.1 The draft Policy is attached at Appendix 2 to this report. For ease of reference all proposed amendments are highlighted; however, Members' attention is drawn to the following:

• Controls for Operator licences

To provide a similar approach to licensed drivers, the proposed amendments set out the framework for determination of Operator licence applications. The proposals also implement additional controls for those persons who are employed or otherwise used by Operators. Operators would be required to provide details of such persons and declare that they are safe and suitable to be so employed/used.

• Amendment of the definition of vehicles licensed as a Hackney Carriage The Policy currently states that a Hackney Carriage will generally be licensed if it is a 'London Cab style' vehicle. This definition does not accurately reflect the vehicles currently licensed. This is because exemptions previously granted by this Committee have permitted very similar vehicles, but these were not true London cab style. The definition has been amended accordingly, but is unchanged in that Hackney Carriages must be purpose built, have wheelchair access and therefore be easily recognisable as being distinct from a Private Hire vehicle.

Accessibility of licensed vehicles

Proposed amendments have been made to reflect the commencement of the remaining parts of Sections 165 and 167 of the Equality Act 2010. Much of these requirements are detailed in the current Policy, but the proposed amendments ensure full compliance with these provisions, which includes a detailed list of vehicles designated for the purposes of Section 165 of the Equality Act 2010. It is proposed that the list be referenced in the Policy, but maintained separately. This is because the list will change more frequently than the Policy and will allow it to be easily communicated to the public, drivers and vehicle owners. The implication of being on the list is that those drivers are obligated to take wheelchair passengers, unless exempted. However, given that the Council has long required Hackney Carriages to be wheelchair accessible, this is not expected to cause any significant problems in the availability of accessible vehicles. Accordingly, the recommendation contained in this report allows for the list attached at Appendix 3 to be published and maintained. If Members are minded to approve the recommendation, the list would take effect from 1 July 2017 so as to give vehicle owners and drivers sufficient notice.

Requirements for vehicle advertising The restrictions on the nature and type of advertising on licensed vehicles have been updated.

Immigration controls

Proposed amendments have been made to reflect the requirements of the Immigration Act 2016 as a means to prevent illegal working in the private hire and/or hackney carriage sector.

Vehicle damage during period of licence
 Under current procedures, drivers are not required to inform the Council if their vehicle is damaged during the period of licence. Proposed amendments require such notification within 7 days as a means to monitor damage to vehicles and allow action to be taken where necessary.

Other amendments

- Clarification of the medical requirements for drivers
- Clarification of the procedure for DBS disclosures with reference to the Council's use of a third party contractor for this process
- o Update of environmental considerations for vehicles
- Other inconsequential amendments
- 4.2 If Members approved the draft Policy, it is proposed that the document be subject to public consultation that will last from 3 July 2017 to 25 September 2017. During this time, all licensed drivers, vehicle owners and operators will be contacted to make them aware of the amendments and of the need to submit any comments during the consultation period. In addition, information will be posted on the Council's website, in the Licensing reception at Robert Hodge Centre and also in the local press.
- 4.3 Any comments received during the consultation period will be assessed and brought back to this Committee on 10 October 2017. If Members approve the final version of the Policy at that time, it will be implemented thereafter.

5.0 SUSTAINABILITY IMPLICATIONS/COMMUNITY STRATEGY

The Policy has the potential to impact upon many areas within the Community. The Licensing Objectives, therefore, has some associations with the Community Strategy, and the proposals have the following links with the Community Strategy: Community Safety (issues A, C and E); Economy and Employment (issue D).

6.0 FINANCIAL AND RESOURCE IMPLICATIONS

6.1 No additional financial or other resources are required.

7.0 RISK ASSESSMENT

7.1 The Council has a legal duty to administer the Hackney Carriage and Private Hire licensing regime, but not to prepare and operate a Policy document. However, given the complexity of the licensing regime, it is good practice for the Council to formulate and publish relevant policies and standards. Given that Members have already approved the existing Policy, a failure to improve and maintain the requirements of the Policy could result in criticism from the community including statutory bodies, the taxi trade, the travelling public and other interested parties.
